When Is It Enough?

"And may G-d Almighty give you mercy before the man..." (Bereishis 43:14)

RASHI: A Midrashic explanation is: He who said to the Universe, "Enough!", may He say "Enough!" to my troubles. I have had no rest since my youth trouble through Laban, trouble through Esau, the trouble of Rachel, the trouble of Dinah, the trouble of Joseph, the trouble of Shimon, the trouble of Benjamin (Genesis Rabbah 92:1).



Imagine the following: Klal Yisrael had a large army, went to war against the Greeks, and won the war! After the war was over, the Priests from the Holy Temple returned to the secret hiding place where they had hidden all the pure oil, and lo and behold, all the oil was intact and ready to be used immediately for the rekindling of the Menorah in the Temple. If all this had happened, would we be celebrating Chanukah now? We understand that the miraculous nature of the many into the hands of the few, the strong into the hands of the weak, etc. brings us to realize what we should know and feel all the time, which is that Hashem is running the world. When things just seem to work out as we expect naturally, we often fail to see that Hashem is also the orchestrator in these mundane situations.

I saw a parable on this subject by Rabbi Shimshon Pincus which I believe really hits the point.

A child goes to the store with his parent and asks his parent to buy him some kind of a treat that costs a few shekels. The parent responds, "It's too expensive!" How does the child feel when he hears this response? He feels that he is not even worth these few shekels, for the child knows that for these few shekels he would be pleased, and yet his parent is not willing to spend this money on him. We adults then tell the child, "No, your parent loves you, and you should not judge your parent based on the fact that he said this treat is too expensive." Even with this statement of reassurance, many children would not be certain that their parent really loves them, or how much that love is really worth.

A few days later, this same child is in desperate need of something more, not just a treat. The parent takes off a day of work, spends an enormous amount of time with the child, and lavishes his love on him. Now the child is certain that his parent loves him. Unfortunately for the



small child, catastrophe had to almost strike in order for him to appreciate that which was obvious to others.

Our appreciation of Hashem would have been lacking (like the boy before he was in the desperate situation) had the war against the Greeks been won in a natural way.

When Hashem created the world, the process was set in motion in a way that it would complete itself to the fullest. The Daas Tevunos explains the gemora, which teaches us that Hashem had to say dai! (enough!), for since He wanted Man to complete the world, He had to place him in an incomplete world. Hashem wanted us to complete ourselves and the world. This means that inadequacies are actually a blessing in disguise. Based on this, Rav Pinchas explains that this is why Hashem made this world incomplete: So that we should see His hand and His love for us through that which we have to accomplish. Regarding the prayer which Yaakov offered in the source verse above, Yaakov was davening that we should be in a position where Hashem's salvation brings about a realization of Hashem's love for us and therefore we should no longer need bad things to happen in order to feel this.

Every year on Chanukah we have an obligation to not only commemorate, but to relive the euphoria of our victory, as we say in the *brocho*, *Bayamin haheim bazman hazeh*. Just as in those times, so too in our times. Though we are spared the physical tension of having to go through this test, we are expected to share the same feelings of closeness to Hashem that they felt andto be grateful to Hashem for all the miracles that happen day in and day out (whether we see them or not).

A Shabbos Story

Every Shabbes Chanukah we would go to our brother and sister in laws' home in Flatbush, Brooklyn.

Shabbes Chanukah is always one of the shortest of the year, and the traffic between New York and New Jersey islways a challenge.

We would all take the day off from school or work and allow up to 3 hours of travel time for the drive which is about 28 miles or 45.5 km.

It was stop and go traffic the entire drive there!

By the time we parked the car and arrived at our intended destination, it was candle lighting time.

When we arrived, Shira's sister informed us that we were staying somewhere else in the neighborhood. We had no idea where we were staying, or how to walk there, but wherever it was we knew we had to walk really quickly!

As we were walking, Shkiah was rapidly approaching.

It was clear to us we were not going to be able to arrive at our host's home on time.

We looked at all the homes and could see that people were already lighting their menorahs before lighting their Shabbes candles.

I then said to Shira, "we are going to need to find a place to store our stuff. We are not going to make it to our destination on time."

At that moment, I looked at one house, and said, "this is the place where we are going to stay for Shabbes, "they have such a beautiful menorah!



Hashem was very kind to us. We knocked on the door, they looked at us with a slightly bewildered look, and then graciously welcomed us in. The first question they asked of us, complete strangers to these folks, was "Did you light Chanukah lichtzen yet?"

Later, I explained my rationale for knocking on the door of this particular family. I said, "those who are meticulous to beautify the mitzvah of Chanukah candles above and beyond the requirements, will be meticulous with the mitzvah of hosting guests which requires a much greater effort.

At the moment when one realizes that all is lost, it then becomes abundantly clear that our help always comes from Hashem through miracles at the speed of light. The light that Hashem shares with us every day provides us with the clarity and strength to sanctify our time through the performance of mitzvos; in our story, the mitzvah of *Nairos Chanukah* and the opportunity appreciate and acknowledge the majesty and beauty of a miracle.

מתי אומרים ״די!״

וָקֶל שַׁלַּי יִמֵּן לָכֶם רַחֲמִים לִפְנִי הָאִישׁ (בראשית מד:יד)

קל שקי. .. וּמִדְרָשׁוֹ מִי שֶׁאָמֵר לֶעוֹלֶם דַּי, יֹאמֵר דַּי לְצְרוֹתֵי, שֶׁלֹא שָׁקְטְתִּי מִנְּעוּרֵי, צָרַת לָבָן, צָרַת תַשָּׁו, צָרַת רָחֵל, צְרַת דִּינָה, צָרַת יוֹסֵף, צָרַת שִׁמְעוֹן, צָרַת בִּנִימִין: (בראשית רבה צב:א)

ראיתי משל על הנושא הזה מאת הרב שמשון פינקוס שלדעתי באמת קולע לעניין.

ילד נכנס לחנות עם ההורים שלו ומבקש מהם לקנות לו איזה ממתק בכמה שקלים. ההורים עונים, "זה יקר מדי!" כשהילד שומע את התגובה הזו הוא עלול להרגיש שהוא אפילו לא שווה את השקלים הבודדים האלה, שכן הילד יודע עם כסף קטן הוא יהיה מרוצה, ובכל זאת ההורים שלו לא מוכנים להוציא עליו את הכסף הזה. המבוגרים אז אומרים לילד, "ההורה שלך באמת אוהב אותך, וזה לא נכון להניח שלא אוהבים אותך רק בגלל שאמרו שממתק הזה יקר מדי." אפילו עם הצהרת נחמה זו, ילדים רבים לא יהיו בטוחים שההורה שלהם באמת אוהב אותם

כמה ימים לאחר מכן, אותו ילד זקוק בדחיפות למשהו נוסף, לא רק לממתק. ההורה מנצל יום חופש מהעבודה, מבלה זמן עצום עם הילד, ומרעיף עליו את אהבתו. כעת הילד בטוח שההורה אוהב אותו. אבל למרבה הצער, עבור הילד הקטן, היה צריך כמעט אסון כדי שיבין את מה שהיה ברור לאחרים.

ההערכה שלנו למה שה' עושה עבורנו הייתה חסרה (כמו הילד לפני שהיה במצב דחוף), לו היינו מנצחים במלחמה נגד היוונים בצורה טבעית.

כאשר ה' ברא את העולם, התהליך הופעל באופן שהעולם יהיה שלם במלואו. הדעת תבונות מסבירה את הגמרא, שמלמדת אותנו שה' היה צריך לומר "די!", כי מאחר שרצה שהאדם ישלים את העולם, היה עליו להעמיד עולם שאינו מושלם. ה' רצה שנשלים את עצמנו ואת העולם. זה אומר שהחוסרים הם בעצם ברכה במסווה. בהתבסס על
