A Vacation to Remember

"...and you delve into them..." (Devarim 6:7)

Rashi tells us that most of one's speech should be in Torah and all else should be secondary. "Idle chatter" is known to us as "bitul Torah" and we are very familiar with its negative aspects. There is a question about Tisha B'Av



(which just passed) that is discussed by the poskim. On Tisha B'Av one is not permitted to learn Torah, for learning Torah brings spiritual joy. On Tisha B'Av one is permitted to learn things which generally bring a person down. There is a question as to whether one is obligated to learn these topics (Rav Elyashiv in Kovetz Teshovos 3:168), or if the day of Tisha B'Av itself suspends the obligation of learning Torah, however there is *heter* to learn these particular topics (Kaf Hachayim 554:10). But it's clear, that as one is not supposed to have a hesech hadas from the mourning of Tisha B'Av, idle conversation is certainly inappropriate. However, on regular days, most of us have difficulty not getting involved in things which could possibly be deemed devarim beteilim.

In Yiddish there is an expression "Mikvah news". It seems that many people, when they are undressed, lose their dignity and speak improperly. They seem to do this just to have a good time. Therefore, the value of such chatter is negligible. Rav Chaim Volozhoner's brother Rav Zalman, who was an amazing person, had an opposite approach. When he would be in the bathhouse, he would have conversations about politics or science, dazzling the people with whom he spoke. They found it hard to believe that this person who had an unquenchable thirst for knowledge of the world around us could also be such a great masmid. However, when they asked him for an explanation, they were shocked to find out that the exact opposite was the truth. His only real interest and passion was Torah. However, he came up with this great idea to pursue general knowledge, in order to find something to keep his mind busy in the places where

Q&A: Leaving the Holy Land

Yitzchak Tzvi had the entire month of Nissan off from Yeshiva. As he had a lot of free time, he thought of taking a vacation and flying to Greece. According to the M.B., may he fly from his home in Eretz Yisrael to Greece to tour?

No. The M.B. says it is forbidden to leave Eretz Yisrael except for a mitzvah. *OC 531; M.B. 14*

Q&A: Shave and a Haircut

Richard Kagan had his hair cut 2 days before Pesach but, by the first day of *chol hamoed* at the Boca Gateways Hotel, he looked a bit unkempt and wanted to improve his appearance in front of his elderly father. Is he permitted to cut his hair or shave his beard during *chol hamoed*? What do the M.B. and the A.H. say?

Both the M.B. & A.H. forbid shaving and cutting hair on chol hamoed, even if a person had his hair cut immediately before YomTov, due to mar'is ayin: If other people were to see that it is permissible to shave on chol hamoed, they will then assume it may be done in all situations, even in a case where he did not have his hair cut before Yom Tov. This would lead to people not preparing their hair properly for Yom Tov as they would plan to take a haircut during chol hamoed when they would not be busy. Therefore, the Rabbis prohibited haircuts during chol homoed in order to force people to do so before Yom Tov so that they would look well groomed. Note that while this is the generally accepted halacha, today there are several poskim who will permit a person who shaves every day to continue to do so during *chol hamoed*. OC 531; M.B. 4; A.H. 2

Q&A: Haircut #I

Mr. & Mrs. Silverman let their son Chaim's hair grow until he was three years old, and now they wanted to invite all the relatives over during *chol hamoed* Pesach for his *upshirin* — a boys' first haircut. Are they permitted to cut his hair on *chol hamoed*?



Yes. This is because the reason for Chaim's haircut is not to make his hair shorter or neater, but instead to teach Chaim the importance of the *mitzvah* of *payos*, as the parents will make sure to leave *payos* on the corners of his head when the haircut is finished.

it is forbidden to learn Torah. In order to make sure that he wouldn't have Torah thoughts in these places, he made sure to get very absorbed in these secular topics.

In recent years I heard from a student of Chacham Ben Tzion Abba Shaul Z"L that when he would go to relieve himself, he had two bochurim standing outside, each one reading aloud a different newspaper at the same time in order to keep his mind occupied and not learn. It seems that regarding newspapers there isn't enough intelligence in just one paper to keep one's mind occupied, and so he needed two!

Those ideas are very lofty and distant from many of us. But the issue is especially true at this time of year when many people go on vacation. I would like to offer a piece of advice which I heard in the name of Reb Hillel Zaks Z"L, from when he was the Rosh Yeshiva of the Chevron Yeshiva. He said that if you read a newspaper, make sure that the content is on an intellectual level that you will have something to repeat to someone, even tomorrow.

When we go on vacation, which is proper to do as we need to recharge our batteries, we too should ensure that we do things that we will be happy to remember at a later date and even want to share it with others.

חופשה לזכור

"... וְדָבַּרְתּ, בָּם..." (דברים ו:ז)

רש"י אומר לנו "(ספרי) שלא יהא עיקר דבורך אלא בם עשם עיקר ואל תעשם טפל"(שם). "פטפוט סרק" מוכר לנו כביטול תורה ואנו מכירים היטב את הצד השלילי שלו. ישנה שאלה לגבי תשעה באב ושזה עתה חלף) בה דנים הפוסקים. בתשעה באב אסור ללמוד תורה, כי לימוד תורה מביא שמחה רוחנית. בתשעה באב מותר ללמוד דברים שבדרך כלל מצערים אדם. ישנה שאלה האם חייבים ללמוד נושאים אלו (הרב אלישיב בקובץ תשובות ג:קסח), או שיום תשעה באב עצמו דוחה את חובת לימוד התורה, אולם יש התר ללמוד את הנושאים המסוימים הללו (כף החיים תשד:י). אבל ברור, שכיוון שאסור לעשות הסחת הדעת מהאבלות של תשעה באב, שיחה בטלה בהחלט אינה ראויה. עם זאת, בימים רגילים, רובנו מתקשים שלא להסתבך בדברים שעלולים להיחשב לדברים בטלים.

ביידיש יש ביטוי "מקווה נייעס". נראה שיש אנשים, כשהם לבושים פחות, מאבדים את כבודם ומדברים בצורה לא ראויה. סביר להניח שהם עושים את זה רק כדי להנות מהשיחה. לכן, הערך של פטפוט כזה הוא זניח. לאחיו של הרב חיים וולוז'ונר, הרב זלמו, שהיה אדם מדהים, הייתה גישה הפוכה. כשהוא היה בבית המרחץ, היה מנהל שיחות על פוליטיקה או מדע, והרשים את האנשים שאיתם דיבר. הם התקשו להאמין שהאדם הזה, שהייתה לו תשוקה בלתי ניתנת לכיבוי לדעת את העולם שסביבנו, יכול להיות גם מתמיד כל כך גדול. אולם כשביקשו ממנו הסבר*,* נדהמו לגלות שההפך הגמור הוא האמת. העניין והתשוקה האמיתית היחידה שלו הייתה תורה. עם זאת, הוא הגה את הרעיון הגדול הזה להתעניין בידע כללי, כדי למצוא משהו שיעסיק את דעתו במקומות שאסור ללמוד תורה. כדי לוודא שלא יהיו לו מחשבות תורניות במקומות האלה, הוא דאג להיספג מאוד בנושאים החילוניים.

בשנים האחרונות שמעתי מתלמיד של החכם בן ציון אבא שאול ז"ל שכשהיה הולך לשירותים, עמדו בחוץ שני בחורים, וכל אחד קרא בקול מעיתון אחר בו זמנית כדי להעסיק את דעתו בדברים שאינם לימוד תורה. (נראה שאין מספיק שכל רק בעיתון אחד כדי להעסיק את דעתו, ולכן הוא היה צריך שניים!)
