An Acquired Taste

With regard to the Monn, it is written "bread" (Exodus 16:4), and it is written "oil" (Numbers 11:8), and it is written "honey" (Exodus 16:31). How can we reconcile these verses? Rabbi Yosi, son of Rabbi Chanina, said: For the youth it was like bread, for the elderly it was like oil, and for the children it was like honey. Each received what was appropriate. (Yoma 75b)



The Jewish people are known as "The People of the Book", as they spend an enormous amount of time and effort learning about their religion. The fact that the lay people in *klal Yisroel* are commanded to spend a disproportionate time learning the laws of their religion, is unique to Judaism. In most other religions, as long as one does not transgress the laws one is doing OK. There is no commandment to study the laws, just not to transgress them. We, on the other hand, consider learning about all the laws of Judaism a central aspect of our religion. In addition, the *mitzvah* of Talmud Torah is even equivalent to all other *mitzvos* combined!

After internalizing the importance of leaning Torah, one must determine what is it that he should learn. Whether one is the greatest of scholars or the simplest school child the material one learns may be the same. The *Gadol hador* and the young boy in first grade both must learn Bereishis. The only difference is the depth of ones' learning differs in order that everyone can learn the whole Torah, each at their own level. This makes our torah universal and personal at the same time. To quote a well-known *Mashgiach*, "Torah is the only thing in the world that both a 5-year-old and a 90-year-old can learn and enjoy."

This may be understood better, based on an explanation given by Rav Meir Shapiro (1887-1933) for the saying,"Lo nitna ha torah ela l'ochlei hamon—The Torah was given specifically to the generation that ate monn." What was unique about the monn? It tasted to each individual exactly as he liked it. In other words, it was personally tailored to his taste at that particular time.



So too, the Torah that we learn may be the exact same verse, but it could have a different meaning to every individual.





Q&A:A Nutty Way to Warm Up

Levy and Yocheved needed some time alone and, after a phone call to Bernie Lowenstein, the two of them drove up to his cabin outside Fallsdale for the last two days of Pesach. On the 7th night, the weather was lovely in the evening but, by midnight, the temperature had dropped to almost freezing, and the two of them had forgotten to turn on the heat. There was one log that someone else had already prepared in the fireplace, so they transferred a fire to the fireplace and began searching for

more fuel. Yocheved suggested that they use the 20 or so walnut and almond shells that they had discarded during dessert as a fuel. May they use these shells to heat up the cabin?



No. These shells are considered *mukseh* and may not be moved. This is because, at the start of Yom Tov, these shells were considered human food. Now that the walnuts and almonds have been removed from the inside, they are considered animal food — the animal food was created on Yom Tov and, therefore, has a status of *nolad* and may not be used. Note that while they may not be used for fuel, if Yocheved finds these shells to be offensive, she may dispose of them in the rubbish bin.

Q&A: Coals to Ignition

The men came home from shul on Shavuos morning soon after Maida Brochstein finished grilling the chickens. It was such a delightful day that Harry Brochstein decided to eat lunch on the deck next to the pool. But, after a few minutes outside,



the mosquitoes began to bite. Fortunately, he had a citronella candle ready to ward off these mosquitoes — he just needed to transfer a flame. While he could go into the house, he saw that the grill next to the pool had coals that were still glowing red — albeit without a flame. May Harry take a match, stick it into the coals so that the heat ignites it, and then transfer the flame to the citronella candle?

Yes. Since the coals are red hot, they are considered to have a fire, and it would be permitted to transfer this fire via a match. Many hold that this is the reason that one may put a match to an electric stove that is glowing red. However, one may not put a match next to an object that is merely hot in order to try to obtain a flame, and certainly one may not rub the match along this hot surface in order to get the sulfur on the match to ignite.

שמשקיעים כמות עצומה של זמן ומאמץ בלימוד תורתנו. העובדה שהאנשים הרגילים בכלל ישראל מצווים להשקיע זמן רב בלימוד

הלכות התורה, היא ייחודית ליהדות. ברוב הדתות האחרות, אין מצווה ללמוד לעומק את החוקים, אלא כל עוד שלא עוברים על החוקים זה בסדר. עבורנו, לעומת זאת, לימוד התורה היא היבט מרכזי בדת שלנו. בנוסף, מצוות "תלמוד תורה כנגד כולם"!

לאחר שהפנמנו את החשיבות של לימוד התורה, יש לקבוע מה צריכים ללמוד. בין גדול המלומדים ובין הילד התמים ביותר, החומר הנלמד עשוי להיות זהה. גדול הדור והילד בכיתה א' שניהם צריכים ללמוד פרשת בראשית. ההבדל היחיד הוא שעומק הלמידה של כל אדם שונה, כך שכל אחד יוכל ללמוד את כל התורה לפי הרמה שלו. זה הופך את התורה שלנו לכללית ואישית בו זמנית. כפי שאמר משגיח ידוע, "תורה היא הדבר היחיד בעולם שגם בן 5 וגם בן 90 יכולים ללמוד ולהנות ממנו".

אפשר להבין את זה טוב יותר, על סמך הסבר שנתן הרב מאיר שפירא לאמירה "לא ניתנה התורה אלא לאוכלי המן" מה היה ייחודי במן? זה היה טעים לכל אחד בדיוק כמו שהוא אוהב. במילים אחרות, זה היה מותאם אישית לטעמו באותה זמו.

וזה הדומה ללימוד התורה, שכל אדם יכול ללמוד ברמתו הספציפית באותו רגע בדיוק. כולנו אכלנו את אותו מן, אבל טעמו שונה לכל אדם, מותאם לחיך הייחודי שלו. כך גם התורה שאנו לומדים היא אולי אותו פסוק בדיוק, אבל יכולה להיות לה משמעות שונה לכל אדם.

השבוע כשאנחנו קוראים פרשת המן, עלינו לחשוב שגם התורה נוצרה רק בשבילי! זה יכול "לטעום" בדיוק למה שאני צריך באותו זמן. צריכים לזכור שיש חלק בתורה שמתאים לנו בכל רגע נתון. התפקיד שלנו הוא למצוא
